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President's Message By: James Laukkonen

I was no more than 5 years old when I decided that I wanted to be an attorney. In my understanding, attorneys helped people. Of course, I also thought that clowns helped people, but I knew I didn't have the skill to be a clown. No, I wanted to be an attorney. My mother still chuckles when telling people about her bright-eyed little kid. "Well, actually," I would say "the law in this state is that . . ." whatever the heck the adults were talking about.

My dad held a different opinion. Attorneys were scum. They were snakes. They were liars. They were the worst thing to ever darken the face of the earth. If any pitiable creature was so loathsome as to be worse than an attorney, that was a judge. In his reasoning judges let the liars lie. Knowing that they were liars, having the authority to correct the behavior, but declining to do so was the lowest of the low. They sullied their robes. I never did learn what chain of events formed his opinions, but he was adamant.

What I did learn was that his opinions were enforced with the authority of a thousand judges. "No child of mine will ever be an attorney!", he'd thunder. "I'd sooner end you now, than allow that!" He had spoken, and I had no choice but to obey. Of course, I was still a bit young at the time.

The years passed; I progressed through school. What I wanted mattered little. Dad had spoken, and so I obeyed. Despite graduating high school at the top of my class, I didn't head straight to college. There seemed to be little point. If I was not destined to be an attorney, then I would need to find some other way to earn my keep. I sold vacuums. I worked retail. I tended bar. I played in bands. I worked as a stone mason, a framer, a roofer, and an electrician. I occasionally took classes at a local community college. Photography. Theater. No law. I joined the Army. I went to war. I went with an expeditionary force to Somalia, and that was worse than the war.

More time slipped away. I returned to the states and tried to rebuild my life. Work, sleep, repeat. More stone masonry. More odd jobs. For a decade I wandered in the wilds trying to find work that would add to my *joie de vivre*. As so often happens in tales of this sort, I eventually reached a point in my travels where my oar was mistaken for a winnowing fan. (Homer, *Odyssey*, Book 23, line 263).

I was three stories up on rickety scaffolding with my grandfather. He was about 75 or 80 at the time, and we were laying a 300-pound lintel stone. We had hauled the stone up there by hand, and we were gently positioning it above a window. As we finished, I realized that I had no idea why I was there. There was satisfaction in producing beautiful work, but I was still missing something. It was time to plant my oar. I enrolled in school the next day.

More years, but now they increasingly had meaning. I studied. I graduated with honors. A school back east made an offer that seemed enticing. Off to Virginia and Washington & Lee Law. Honor code, history, tradition. Law. Finally, law. I worked. I took side trips to Monticello, Ash Lawn Highland, Shenandoah, every place I could. I studied. So very much studying.

I returned home to Seattle to sit for the bar. October that same year, and I was an attorney. Dad was disappointed. He was proud that I had achieved so much, but I was an attorney. That really got under his skin. How could I possibly want to be one of *them*? As the years continued their inexorable march, he watched me learn and grow in my practice. One day he finally awoke to the reality that I had seen all those years before. I was helping people.

A View From the Bench

Thank you for asking me to contribute to this issue of the Thurston County Bar Association Legal Brief. I understand that the request is usually one of "A View From the Bench." In my case I am going to share my perspective and experiences from "A View Towards the Bench."

This journey began with an examination of what drives me to run at this time; to serve in general; and why in this role. For me, the reasons to run stem from the ability of this position to carry forward the vision of the quote above.

My passion and compassion for solving complex people problems has been honed by my experiences as a Superior Court Trial attorney for the past 17 years. Serving struggling families, analyzing sometimes abusive uses of authority, applying empathy and forgiveness to empower others has taught me the value of keeping the big picture and the prime objective in my minds active eye. I want to get to the bottom of the problem. At the end of the day, it has always been better to work towards a main objective even if I end up standing alone for a short-while.

None of my achievements happened in a vacuum or as a lone maverick, at least never from my perspective. I have the blessing of being supported from childhood amid a blatantly prejudiced culture in rural North Carolina in the late 60's and early 70's. My family always poured into me and most importantly my curiosity. It is not always easy to answer the kid always asking "but, why?" Fortunately, my family included voracious readers on both sides, and I was very familiar with the A to Z of the Encyclopedia Britannica by age 6. Once learning to read, my questions about the why's of the world were answered with "go look it up." The Encyclopedia is full of solved complex problems!

Since becoming an attorney and spending my career in public service my circle of supports and encouragement has expanded to include close friends, my Army Unit family, former clients, supporters, voters, and peers. Being authentic is critical and from start to finish, I have truly benefitted from having freedom to be me. Freedom to Serve. Freedom to Give of Myself.

As a new judge I plan to pursue strategies that invite leading edge, multi-faceted, multi-disciplined approaches to inclusive decision-making and equitable application of the law. During the campaign I listened carefully to the voters. They want the system to be accountable. They want to know what is going on and how it impacts their community. I am very exciting to be part of the face of the court in this community. The Thurston County Legal Community has multiple opportunities to provide feedback to the Court. But on the impacts of systemwide operations on the community, I think more involvement from the general public is needed. I am here to help. To join you as part of the solution for age-old complex problems. I feel confident that the members of the TCBA are committed to many of these ideals. I am encouraged by the establishment of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Section.

Finally, I find that when I am being most helpful, I function at my highest and get the most satisfaction from my work. A Superior Court Judge carries tremendous responsibility, obligation, accountability and a vast opportunity to be helpful to everyone interested and affected by the law and justice system. These tenets of the privilege are very serious to me but not more than they are to the people who have entrusted me by their votes with this opportunity. We are in a partnership.

Judge-Elect Sharonda D. Amamilo was elected on November 3, 2020 to serve as Thurston County Superior Court Judge Position No. 8. Judge-Elect Amamilo is the first African American elected or appointed judge in Thurston County Washington.







Dear Thurston County Bar Association Members,

NEW WAYS OF PROVIDING PRO BONO SERVICES

LEGAL ADVICE CLINICS: TCVLS's primary mission is to support legal professionals as you look for ways to give back to your community using your knowledge and skills. We are beginning to plan for post-COVID legal aid services this fall. Watch for a return to in-person clinics that give both volunteer attorney and client choices on whether the consultation is by phone, video or in-person. We will be seeking input from a group of volunteers in the next couple of months on how this would work best.

Grocery Manufacturers* lawsuit that was recently upheld by the Court of Appeals, and a complaint regarding paid newspaper endorsements that is currently before the PDC.
